The IAEA Staff Association Ball took place on Saturday, 1

February 2020, at the Hofburg Imperial Palace. The Ball celebrated 'Life below Water', addressing number 14 of the 17 UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDG) and so raising awareness that over three billion people depend on marine and coastal biodiversity for their livelihoods. However, today we can see more than 30 percent of the world's fish stocks overexploited. Whereas oceans absorb some 30 percent of the carbon dioxide produced by humans, we continue to see a significant rise in ocean acidification since the industrial revolution.

Marine pollution is reaching alarming levels, with an average of 13,000 pieces of plastic littering every square kilometre of our oceans. SDG 14 aims to manage and protect marine and coastal ecosystems from pollution in a sustainable manner, as well as address the impact of ocean acidification.

Under this motto, the Hofburg was illuminated with breathtaking underwater views throughout the entrance area, the Feststiege and the Seitengalerie. In addition, and in collaboration with the Natural History Museum of Vienna (NHM) a splendid exhibition focusing on plastic pollution in the marine environment had been set up at the entrance to the Hofburg. The organizing committee invited relevant start-ups and partners to promote green initiatives in this regard.

For the third year in a row, the Ball was organized and certified as a 'green event' by the Austrian Federal Ministry of Sustainability and Tourism. The Staff Association Ball continues to be the only Ball in Vienna to be awarded this green certification.

As has become the tradition over the years, the Vienna Pipes and Drums opened proceedings followed by the UN Security and Safety Service performing the customary flag ceremony. The welcome by the Master



of Ceremonies, Ms Jennifer Lusser, was followed by the lively and entertaining Mariachi Sin Fronteras, with live Mexican music, taking all ball guests on a journey to the most famous squares in Mexico to the accompaniment of Mariachi music.

In continuing the evening's theme, ¡BAILA MÉXICO!, a folklore dance group from Mexico who shared their enthusiasm for the cultural heritage of Mexico as expressed through dance.

The opening ceremony was concluded by a talented Soprano, and IAEA Staff Member, Ms Christina Krawec. She sang beautiful arias and demonstrated her talent and international opera singing experience.

The Staff Council President welcomed the 3,600 guests to the official opening of the 2020 Staff Association Ball. He praised the IAEA staff members for their many achievements and successes over the years and commended the Staff Association Ball Committee on having organised yet again, such a splendid ball.

Another highlight of this evening was the attendance and speech given by the new Director General Mr Rafael Mariano Grossi. He commended the Ball Committee on its endeavours. He knew full well how much effort went into organizing an event of such a scale and thanked all the staff for their dedication and hard work. The Elmayer Dance School performed the traditional debutantes opening waltz joined by Director General Grossi and his wife and concluded the ceremony with a waltz formation comprising a team of professional dancers.

Once again, the Staff Association Ball featured a diverse musical programme. It ranged from The Johann Strauss Ensemble Vienna and the Gerhard Aflenzer Broadway Big Band in the Festsaal to The Strompin' Lickers with Swing in the Zeremoniensaal, followed by the legendary Ceilidh with ALASTAIR. Evelyn Salsa y Sabor performed Latin American music in the salsa room and Hokus Pokus entertained the guests with pop and soul classics in the Rittersaal. Ghettoman & The Believers with their authentic combination of Reggae and Afro grooves performed in the Radetzky Apartments. The Petaw Band, West African music with an electric touch, performed in Forum, followed by the ball's disco, with DJ Mike Allai & DJ Smart Marty MC. In keeping with tradition, the legendary 'Silent Disco' shook the Orchestergang into silence - but the beat was great.


